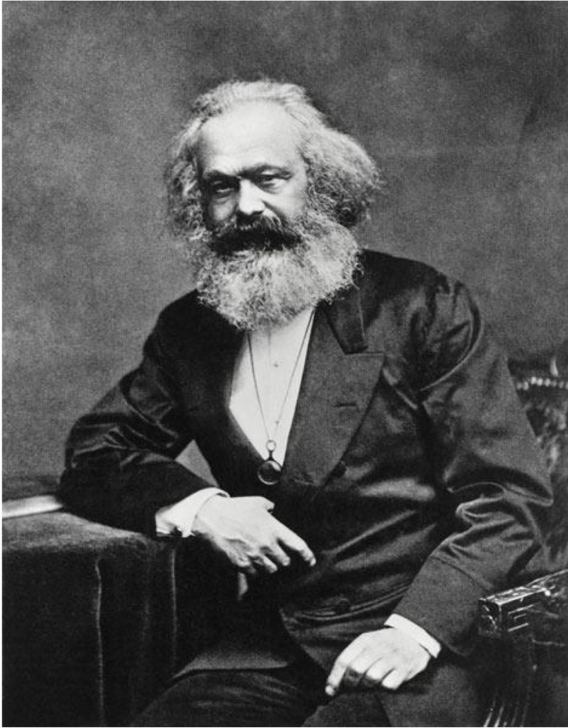


# *Nineteenth-Century* **PROSE**

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The deadline for submissions for notes and reviews for *EWR* Vol. 15 (2023) is **October 15, 2022**. Please see submission guidelines on our website.



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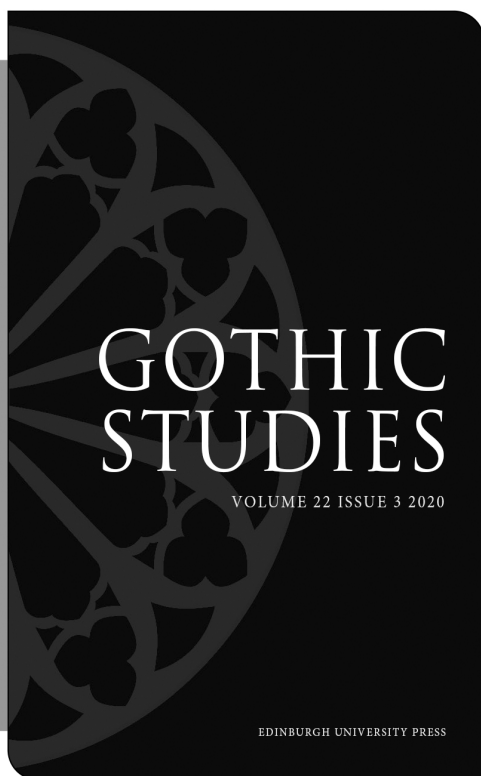
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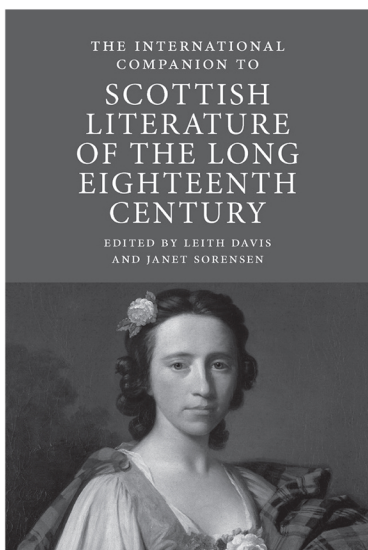
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
